CONRAD CHICAGO

When there's a director of inspiration on staff, you know this is no ordinary city stay. Opening midmonth, this stunner is all midcentury-modern sophistication. BRIGHT LIGHT

FINE ART Artist Carlos Rolón, also known as Dzine, will debut a new piece this month.

A small but ornate chandelier, complete with fake candlewax, made a strong impression on Carlos Rolón as he came of age in

Chicago's Brighton Park neighborhood. The aspirational object still inspires his work. "My practice deals with decoration and its meaning in households," says the artist, who also goes by Dzine. "I appropriate these things in unorthodox ways to examine identity, culture and social connections." This month the internationally renowned artist will debut

his largest chandelier to date in the somewhat unexpected locale of the Fashion Outlets of Chicago in Rosemont, part of its new \$1 million art exhibition initiative. Rolón's A Grand Love Story (analog love in a digital age) investigates the romantic and often ostentatious Victorian era and its iconography, complete
